Parent- and Child-hood

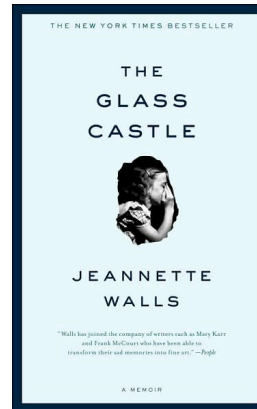
For people of the boomer generation childhood had changed quite a bit by the time they got to revisit it from the other side as parents. Whereas boomers can remember the kind of benign neglect that allowed hours of unsupervised play in what were regarded as safe neighborhood streets, the next generations have been ever more closely guarded till the point where the term “helicopter parents” is an apt description. This month we feature a startling true account of the experience and the effects of parenting from the other extreme.

Featured This Month:

The Glass Castle – a Memoir by *Jeannette Walls*

This award winning memoir is the revelation of a daughter and her three siblings growing up with nomadic parents who at times were great teachers and at other times hopeless dreamers. The parents, Rose Mary and Rex, were both extraordinarily intelligent, but lacked common sense and compassion; the mother, a self-centered artist who would buy canvas and paints for her artwork when the cupboards were bare and a father who dreamed of building his glass castle but spent much of his time looking for the next drink. Under the guise of a “great new adventure” the family “skedaddled” from one hovel to the next, from the deserts of the southwest to a West Virginia coal mining town. The family at most times was destitute, existing only on a monthly check from a Texas ranch marked “for grazing rights”, the mysterious check being occasionally intercepted by Rex to be spent on a new scheme or liquor.

The children learned to fend for themselves by digging through trash containers in the school cafeteria for food, defending one another from the fights and teasing of other children, collecting coal scraps that had fallen from passing trucks and carts for heat. In one instance, the author relates coloring



spots on her skin with markers to disguise the holes in her clothing.

Through all of the neglect and shame, the author surprisingly harbors no ill feelings. The children adored their father and his dreams and though embarrassed by their mother still loved her. The youngest was the only child to display any emotional problems as an adult. The author is now a regular contributor to MSNBC, her brother is a police officer and older sister is a successful freelance artist.

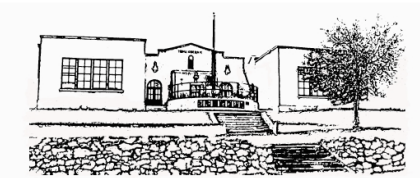
Rose Mary was still living at the time this memoir was published, residing in an abandoned apartment complex in New York City with other homeless and dumpster diving for her next meal.
